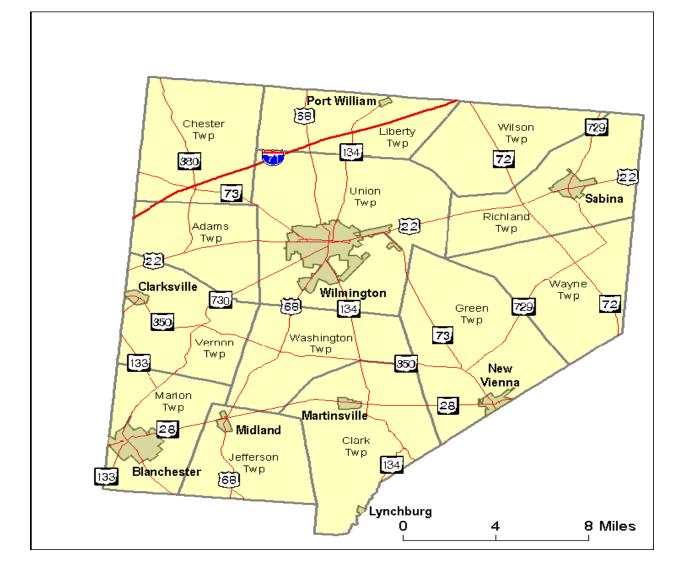

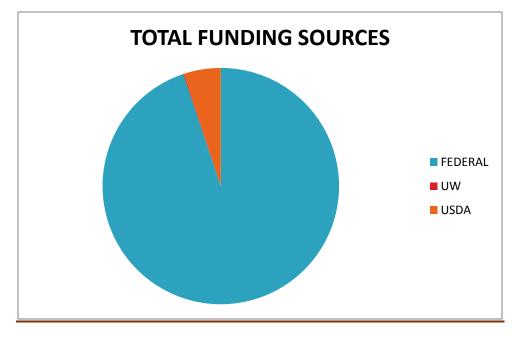

RESULTS OF MOST RECENT FEDERAL REVIEW AND AGENCY AUDIT

FEDERAL REVIEW April, 2014

No deficiencies were found during our recent Federal Review. There was one out of compliance issue regarding the Child Development Outreach Program (CDOP) which provides space for children with disabilities. These children are not enrolled Head Start children. They are part of CDOP and their expenses are covered by the schools district they are a resident. We have space for 10 more children than the Federal Head Start agency is paying for. The problem with this arrangement, from the Federal reviewers point of view was that the school systems was not paying their share and they believed these children were taking the place of children on the waiting list for Head Start. We believe that the schools were paying their fair share and none of these children ever took the place of a child on the Head Start waiting list. We will have to see what we need to do so we can continue with this well received and needed program.





PERCENTAGE OF ENROLLED CHILDREN THAT RECEIVED MEDICAL AND DENTAL EXAMS 13-14

- 1. 100 % of all children who attended Head Start completed their initial physical exams.
- 2. 99% of enrolled children completed their initial dental exam.
- 3. 20 % of all the Head Start children were identified as having a special need and all received services at the Head Start center. The program is only required to enroll 10% of children with special needs. We work very closely with all school systems and Help Me Grow to provide appropriate placement for these children.

GOAL: To provide all families with an opportunity to participate in "The Club" mentoring program. This will occur 2 times a month starting Jan. 2014.

-This was accomplished on August, 2013

Goal: Additional centers will be opened in outlying areas of the county.

-A meeting took place with several rural school districts to determine if there would be room in the schools for a Head Start classroom. It was determined none of the districts has available room at this time but would be interested in the future partnering with Head Start.

Goal: Head Start employees form a committee to enhance open communication Consistency, and team building.

-Meeting took place with top management of CAP. It was decided to survey the employees to see if they would be interested in some form of recognition on an agency level. The results of the survey were the majority of the employees who responded did not want recognition. Committee dissolved.

Kindergarten Preparation Activities:

- 1. Using an assessment tool to discover areas of skills children need to strengthen and adding activities to each lesson plan that addresses these needs so that children are prepared for kindergarten.
- 2. Parents are made aware of the skills children need for kindergarten and they are given activities to do at home to help their child.
- 3. Program also uses "Every Day Math" and "Handwriting without Tears" which are used in public schools to help with transition.
- 4. Kindergarten Make-it Take It was provided by two of our teachers, so the parents can continue to work with their children during the summer.
- 5. Children visited their school which they would be attending in fall and had an opportunity to be in a Kindergarten classroom and meet the teacher.
- 6. Education Coordinator and Program Director met with all the curriculum directors from each school district and reviewed the curriculum which the program utilized, what other services the program provides, and then asked each to provide the program with suggestions for preparing the children to be successful in their school system. They then emailed the program their suggestions which became a part of our curriculum efforts. Only a few of the suggestions were things we were not already practicing.

School Readiness Plan Summary

The School Readiness Plan consists of our Head Start Child Outcomes School Readiness Goals and Alignments, screening procedures, On-going Assessment procedures, use of children progress planning, and agency program improvement. **Head Start Child Outcomes School Readiness Goals** - This encompasses the areas of Social/Emotional, Gross Motor, Fine Motor, Language, Cognitive, Literacy, and Mathematics.

Alignments – The Head Start Child Outcomes, School Readiness Goals, Ohio Pre-Kindergarten Learning Standards and the Creative Curriculum (center curriculum) are aligned with each other to ensure that all goals are being addressed with the children. **Screening procedures** – Screenings are completed on each Head Start child no less than once per program year. Teachers use screening data for planning for the children as individuals and as a whole group.

On-going Assessment – During the program year the teachers collect data on the children and input the data on an online tracking program. This collection is gathered in the fall, winter and spring. Reports are analyzed and used for planning for the children, teacher professional development and program improvements. Ongoing Assessment information is shared with the teachers, parents, and Head Start staff, Policy Council Members, Clinton County CAP Board and the Self-Assessment Team.

SCHOOL READINESS PLAN AND GOALS

Clinton County School Readiness Plan 13-14

Clinton County Head Start has established School Readiness Goals for the children to obtain at the duration of their Head Start Experience. The teachers will use the goals in planning for the children.

Along with the School Readiness Goals we have created an alignment that includes the Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework, Ohio Pre-Kindergarten Content Standards and the Teaching Strategies Gold Objectives for Development & Learning: Birth through Kindergarten on-going assessment which is supported by our curriculum Creative Curriculum.

The progress of the School Readiness Goals and the children's progress will be tracked by the teachers on the Teaching Strategies Gold Objectives for Development & Learning: Birth Through Kindergarten. The first data input is due by November 15, the second by February 14, and the third is due by the end date of the program year. Reports from the Teaching Strategies Gold Objectives for Development & Learning: Birth Through Kindergarten on-going assessment will be pulled in December, March and the end of May. These reports will reflect overall agency progress, individual classroom progress, progress by ages of the children, by gender, and will compare the data with previous program year to the present program year. The agency data report is reported to the Policy Council, Parents, Agency Board, Head Start Staff and the Self-Assessment team.

Based on the analyzes of the reports from the Teaching Strategies Gold Objectives for Development & Learning on-going assessment: Birth Through Kindergarten we will determine if we have set appropriate School Readiness Goals, or if we need to provide more training for the teachers in a particular area. Also, it will give evidence on the following: how the children are doing compared to a normative group, attendance related issues, and English language learners progress. All of this data will be complied for program improvement.

Along with the Teaching Strategies Gold Objectives for Development & Learning: Birth Through Kindergarten on-going assessment the program uses a standardized screening tool Learning Accomplish Profile Screen (LAP-D).When further assessment is needed then the Learning Accomplish Profile-Diagnostic Assessment is completed. Additionally, the teachers use informal assessments in the classroom to check and track the skills that the children exhibit on a daily basis.

Furthermore, the data that the teachers gather through observation, informal assessments, Learning Accomplish Profile Screen and Teaching Strategies Gold Objectives for Development & Learning: Birth Through Kindergarten on-going assessment are used in planning a developmentally appropriate curriculum to meet all the children's needs and way of learning.
