Clinton County Community Action Program, Inc. Community Needs Assessment 2020

In operation since 1965, the Clinton County Community Action Program, Inc. is a local, private, non-profit organization funded largely by grants obtained from Federal and State sources. The primary goal of Community Action is to help reduce poverty in Clinton County. This is accomplished with a variety of different programs and services that are designed to produce jobs and help people in need. The agency is governed by a Board of Trustees. There are fifteen members on the board and all of them are Clinton County Residents.

The mission of Clinton County Community Action Program, Inc. shall be to prevent and alleviate poverty conditions and their causes among urban and rural residents of the agency's service area. To facilitate this, the agency will provide programs and services directly towards improving the quality of life among the socially, economically and educationally disadvantaged. Agency administration and staff will pursue all available opportunities for program/service expansion and enhancement in areas including but not limited to Nutrition, Affordable Housing, Energy Assistance, Education and Health.

All agency activities will be carried out to the extent feasible and consistent with the provisions of law governing any federal, state and local programs. More specifically, the agency will carry out any local functions authorized under any amendments or laws pertaining to non-profit corporations in the State of Ohio.

The needs assessment process allows the agency to see where the community feels there are needs that are not being met in our community. To achieve these rules, the survey information was collected from Community Based Organizations, Faith Based Organizations, Private Sector, Public Sector and Educational Institutions.

Agency Overview

Housing

Community Action is very involved in making sure that families/individuals are given the opportunity to live in affordable housing. Since 1995, we have been building apartment complexes designed to help lower income families/individuals afford a place to live. The complexes are geared toward people that do not make enough money for market rate rent but make too much for subsidized housing.

Family Housing

Community Action currently has two complexes in Clinton County These complexes have 84 units between the two of them. They are divided up into two- and three-bedroom units.

Senior Housing

Senior Housing is available in three different complexes located in Wilmington and one in Blanchester. These complexes have 178 units between the four of them. They are divided up into two- and three-bedroom units. One property is for seniors age 62+ while the other three are for 55+.

In 2020, 409 individuals were provided housing

Housing Rehabilitation

Community Action has purchased homes in the county in need of rehabilitation. Once the homes have been rehabbed, they are then sold. The goal of this process is to improve neighborhoods as well as provide employment opportunities.

Senior Services

Clinton County Community Action has a wide variety of senior services that we operated out of the Wilmington Savings Bank Clinton County Senior Center. The center opened in 2001 and is a perfect location for seniors to spend time doing a multitude of activities. They can even stay the entire day, as the center operates a kitchen to provide meals to the seniors.

<u>Congregate dining</u> is offered daily at the center with a suggested donation of \$2.50. This is a Title III program that provides 1/3 of the recommended daily nutrition requirements of older adults.

3,586 meals were served in 2020

<u>Transportation</u> provides transportation to all Clinton County senior residents 60 or older. The program provides transportation for such activities as: medical appointments, banking, shopping, beauty and barber shop and a variety of other needs within Clinton County.

1, 703 rides were provided to seniors for a variety of needs in 2020.

<u>Supportive Services</u> are also available at the senior center. Seniors can obtain current information regarding social security, Medicare, Medicaid and supplemental insurance plans as well as receiving assistance completing program applications.

397 seniors were assisted during 2020.

<u>Recreation and Exercise</u> programs are offered daily at the center.

156.25 hours of wellness activities were provided during 2020.

Monthly Food Box senior households receive a monthly food box providing food assistance.

50 households received monthly food boxes during 2020.

Weekly Hot Meals weekly meals are delivered to seniors needing the extra food assistance.

53,323 weekly meals were delivered during 2020.

Head Start

For 53 years, Clinton County Community Action has provided families with family centered services including high quality preschool to over 100 children ages three, four and five annually. Families may enroll their children in half day or full day sessions. Highly qualified teachers provide a rich learning experience in four classrooms and outdoors. Learning in the classroom is supported by a comprehensive approach to school readiness, which includes family engagement, health, dental health, mental health, nutrition and other services.

The curriculum is based on the science of how children learn; matches Ohio's early Learning Guidelines and is consistent with the expectations of the Federal Head Start program. Head Start is led by a group of community members and parent, the Policy Council, who are elected by the families and who ensure that the program is responsive to the needs of the community.

112 children were enrolled during 2020.

Food Pantry

The Community Action food pantry is a free service to help families/individuals that are struggling to put food on the table. The service provides applicants with a three-day supply of food including, meats, vegetables and fruits. Each household is eligible one time per month for this service.

847 boxes of food were provided assisting 1,637 people, with food valuing \$65,850.

Weatherization

Weatherization is a free service to those who qualify. It is a program designed to make homes more energy efficient. The goal is to create an energy efficient environment that not only is conserving energy but doing so with health and safety being top priority. Weatherization has been in service since 1976 when the Title IV Energy Conservation and Production Acts were set in place. The weatherization crew at Clinton County Community Action has over 50 years combined of service experience installing weatherization materials. Weatherization is available to both homeowners and renters who qualify according to income limits.

63 dwellings were weatherized with an average value of \$7,947.16 in materials installed during 2020.

Home Energy

The Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) aids eligible households with paying heating and cooling bills. The amount of assistance is determined by various factors including federal funding levels, how many people live in the household, total household income and the primary fuel used to heat the home. The program is here to help families in the area have heat in the winter months. The program eligibility for the HEAP program is 175% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines.

3,548 applications were completed during 2020.

CARS

CARS is a program that has been in operation since 2000. It was created to help individuals that were unable to make a down payment on a vehicle or had bad credit that was preventing them from obtaining a loan. Community Action acts as a bank and provided a vehicle that the individual can afford. Depending on what the individual can afford, a vehicle and payment plan is selected for them so they can have a form of transportation.

In 2020, there were 11 current loans for a total amount of \$59,603.10. During 2020, one individual paid off their loan.

Medical Transportation

This program, funded by the local United Way Program, assists individuals with gas cards for out of county doctor visits.

22 gas cards were distributed in 2020.

Homemaking

Individuals received assistance cleaning their home, doing laundry or grocery shopping.

163 different clients were provided services on a weekly or bi-weekly basis in 2020.

Survey Results

The Community Needs Assessment Survey was sent to sixteen different groups of people which included members from Community Based Organizations, Faith Based Organizations, Private Sector, Public Sector, Educational Institutions, Head Start Parents, and Community Action Board Members. The surveys were mailed, but they also had the option to complete online. A total of 266 responses were recorded from online surveys and ones that were mailed back.

Key topics included in the assessment were living wage jobs, affordable housing, adequate social services, childcare, sources of food, services for seniors, transportation, strengths in the county, conditions of poverty in the county, and causes of poverty in the county.



Population by Race




Population by Sex

According to the United States Census Bureau, the sex of the population of Clinton County residents is 51% Female and 49% male.




Population by Age
